Dr Tony Foley

Tony is a GP working in Kinsale, County Cork. He is a Lecturer in the Department of General Practice in UCC and is co-convenor of the MICGP clinical skills exam for the Irish College of General Practitioners (ICGP). Tony's interests include dementia in the primary care setting and interprofessional education in multidisciplinary teams.

He is Project Lead and PI for the PREPARED project (Primary Care Education, Pathways & Research of Dementia). PREPARED is a national primary care dementia initiative, which seeks to up-skill and support GPs and allied healthcare professionals in their delivery of integrated dementia care in the community.

Tony was an Adviser on the Working Group for the Irish National Dementia Strategy and has co-authored a dementia reference guide for the ICGP. He is currently pursuing an MD thesis, focusing on educational interventions in dementia care.



Dr Aileen Lewis

Aileen is the Principal Specialist Clinical Psychologist on the Old Age Psychiatry Team based at St Vincent's University Hospital for almost 20 years. A graduate of both UCD and Queen's University Belfast (D.Clin.Psych) she has worked in the field of older adult mental health since qualification in 1991. Given that her primary degree before transferring into

psychology was in education (1984), teaching and psycho education is a fixture within her clinical practice. She developed and co-coordinated the 'Nursing Home Education Programme' within the service at St Vincent's in 2004.

This initiative resulted from an identified need within her clinical work and was awarded an Innovation prize within the hospital in that year. The programme ran for a number of years and its aim was to provide basic multi-disciplinary education into the mental health and psychological needs of older adults in institutional care where mental health training was scarce among staff and symptoms of dementia were frequently confused with mental health attributions.

A number of profession specific initiatives within the service have replaced the programme over time, and carer education is now largely on a 1:1 basis with carers referred in complex cases to Dr Lewis and her colleague Dr Deirdre McNally by team members. The focus of the work (constituting approx 1/3 of clinical caseload) is to preserve care at home through attention to historical dynamics in family and dyadic relationships, and to rebalance care to incorporate carer well-being.

Dr Wilhelmina Hoffman

Dr. Wilhelmina Hoffman is a geriatrician, who has focussed for the last 35 years on dementia care, education and development. Headmaster at Stiftelsen Silviahemmet where she started work in 2004.

Stiftelsen Silviahemmet is a foundation established by Her Majesty Queen Silvia in 1996. Dr Hoffman has held the position of president of the government funded Swedish National Competence Centre, the Swedish Dementia Centre since 2008.



Dr Kate Irving

Kate's doctoral thesis focused on the care of people with dementia in acute medical wards. For the last decade she has focused on research in the area of dementia prevention and early intervention. Kate is a member of the National Dementia Strategy Monitoring Group chaired by the Department of Health. Kate leads a clinical service called Memory

Works in DCU, committed to helping people make sense of their memory problems and finding positive responses to them.

Funded research projects include, IN MINDD (Innovative Midlife Intervention for Dementia Deterrence), Dem@care, Ambient Assisted Living for the promotion of independence in dementia, REMPAD, reminiscence therapy aided by intelligent multimedia search systems, SenseCam and cognitive stimulation therapy for early dementia care.



Professor Bob Woods

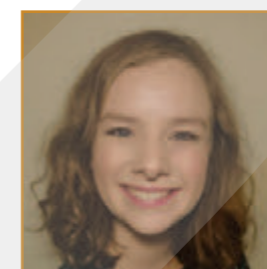
Bob Woods is Professor of Clinical Psychology of Older People at Bangor University, Wales where he is Director of the Dementia Services Development Centre Wales. His research has involved the systematic development of evidence-based psychosocial interventions for people with dementia and their care-givers, including cognitive stimulation and reminiscence approaches. He is an Alzheimer's Society Ambassador, a member of Alzheimer Europe's Expert Advisory Panel and a board member of INTERDEM, the European network on psychosocial research in dementia care.



Dr Suzanne Timmons

Suzanne Timmons is a geriatrician in Cork, Senior Lecturer in the Centre for Gerontology and Rehabilitation, UCC, and Programme Coordinator for the MSc in Older Person Rehabilitation, UCC. Dr. Timmons has a special interest in health service research and quality improvement in the area of dementia care in acute hospitals. She was the co-lead for the Irish National Audit of Dementia (INAD) in 2013/2014, and the Northern Ireland Audit of Dementia (NIAD) in 2015.

Dr. Timmons is leading / supervising research projects into the prevalence, course and long-term outcomes of older people with dementia admitted to acute hospitals (Cork Dementia Study); the promotion of physical activity in older people in acute hospitals (APEP study); early delirium recognition/detection (Cork Delirium Studies), and is President Elect of the Irish Delirium Society. She is the lead for the Cork Integrated Dementia care Across Settings (Cork-IDEAS) project, a Genio/HSE-funded partnership between Mercy University Hospital and Cork community to develop an integrated dementia care pathway between the community and acute hospital.



Ms Daisy Robson

Daisy Robson is the Youth Engagement Officer for the UK's leading dementia charity, Alzheimer's Society. Daisy is passionate about empowering communities to make positive change: whether in her native Scotland volunteering with her local Brownie pack; her adopted-homeland of Yorkshire where she managed Good Neighbours services for older people; or volunteering in Pune, India, raising awareness of HIV/AIDS prevention. Daisy coordinated the Dementia Friends awareness-raising movement across the North East of England, helping to reach over one million Dementia Friends.

Most recently, Daisy launched the Alzheimer's Society's four year partnership with the Scouts Association by appearing with Bear Grylls in a video about dementia. In her spare time, she serves on the Board of the York Library Service, leading on their Children & Young People advisory group.
